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### What is a CRA?

A Community Redevelopment Agency is a dependent special district established pursuant to State law by local government. The mission of the Cape Coral CRA is to enhance the South Cape and create a vibrant urban village. The CRA encourages public and private investments to encourage economic growth and improve the quality of life in the redevelopment area. The Cape Coral City Council sits as the CRA Board of Commissioners and directs CRA policy and programs. Cape Coral City Manager John Szerlag serves as the Executive Director of the CRA.

### Why create a CRA?

A CRA focuses attention and resources in a specific area characterized by blight and disinvestment. By establishing a CRA, a City can take advantage of financial and planning tools provided under State law. These tools can help create programs and projects to foster private market investment in the CRA.

### Upcoming CRA Improvement Projects/Plans

### **Stormwater Demonstration Project**

An \$800,000 stormwater project on Lafayette Street between Cape Coral Street and Vincennes Boulevard will begin May 2013. Project includes installation of stormwater filtration system, road resurfacing, replacement and widening of sidewalks. These improvements may provide an alternative for onsite stormwater management for developers and improve the economics of property development. This could foster new commercial and mixed-use projects.

### Streetscape Demonstration Project

As part of the stormwater project, the CRA will add a "streetscape component." The first phase in FY 2013 (\$100,000) will include pavers, island/bulb outs and installation of palm trees. The second phase in FY 2014 (\$150,000) will include decorative streetlights, LED up-lighting of the palm trees.

### "Zero Setback"

A change in the City of Cape Coral Land Use and Development regulations will remove setback requirements and allow businesses to extend fences to their property line.

### **Tree Mitigation Program**

CRA will encourage use of tree mitigation program, which provides flexibility to developers and businesses for meeting tree planting requirements while improving tree canopy in the CRA area.


### **Financial Report**

The Cape Coral Community Redevelopment Agency received 90 percent of its revenue from locally derived taxes. The CRA began the FY2012 budget year with \$3,185,661 in Fund Balance and expended \$1,335,258 over the fiscal year.



The majority of FY2012 expenditures were for the daily operations of the CRA including personnel, rent, and programming. In addition, the CRA worked on completing planning efforts and updating zoning regulations.



The CRA built up fund balance over the prior few years in recognition of downward pressure on revenues and has been spending down fund balance.



The CRA has remaining outstanding debt of \$4,294,140 for undergrounding of utilities.

### CRA Future Economic Development Plans

### Financial Sustainability

Ensuring the financial sustainability of the Cape Coral Community Redevelopment Agency led to the City Council's decision to transfer the governance to the elected body. By transitioning responsibilities to City staff, the CRA will be able to preserve and grow its fund balance. These funds will be used to leverage future projects and investments within the CRA.

### **Zyscovich Vision Plan Implementation**

CRA Board and staff will continue to review and evaluate components of the Zyscovich Vision Plan to identify viable projects for the CRA.

### Volunteer Involvement

CRA staff will coordinate with CRA stakeholders to identify opportunities to raise the visibility of the South Cape.

### **Economic Development Incentives**

- Determine specific needs within the business community
- Identify grant or incentive opportunities to encourage economic development
- Identify targeted industries for the South Cape and establish strategies to attract these industries to the CRA
- Provide site development assistance to new and existing businesses
- Establish guidelines and timelines to provide permitting services that are fair, fast and predictable.
